THE DIOCESAN MISSION.- Our Mission of Oct. 25-28th and November 3-5th has come and gone, and we HOPE that, in spite of some defects in the arrangement, it will have done some permanent good. The lady visitors, Misses Pickard Hall and Skinner, were most diligent in visting from house to house, and Miss Hall gave addresses to mothers on the 26th in the Reading Room, to girls on the 27th in the Hall, where there was also an open meeting on the 25th. On Friday, Nov. 3rd, a service was held in the Hall, and on Saturday afternoon, Nov. 4th, an open-air service and procession took place. Fortunately the weather was fine. Starting from the Church at 3 p.m., we walked through the village, halting at the end of the High Street and of Rothschild Road, and at the top of Littleworth Hill. There were prayers and addresses at these points. There was a goodly gathering at each halt, and many went all round. The procession was headed by the Church Banner, then came the clergy and the choir, who sang hymns all the way. Thanks to Mr. H. Caves' leadership, the singing was excellent and well taken up by all who followed. We started from the Church at 3 and re-entered it as the clock struck 4.

THE FORTNIGHTLY Prayer Meetings at the Parish Room will be held on Fridays, Dec. 8th and 22nd, at 3pm.

After some discussion it was decided to hand the above balance to the Belgian Red Cross Society. The Chairman was requested to communicate to Mr. Rothschild the hearty thanks of the committee for his kindness in lending "The Chestnuts," and latterly No. 1, The Terrace, Littleworth, to house our poor guests. Without this generous aid it would have been hard to accomdate them. The thanks of the village are also due to Dr. Chignell for the immense amount of trouble he has taken throughout, to Mr. Merry for his care of the funds, and (though all the members of the committee have done their part well), to Mrs. Hooker, whose knowledge of French and constant attention to the wants of the families, were invaluable.

THE BELGIAN COMMITTEE.- As both the families of Belgian refugees have now left us (they are now at Glasgow and have found employment in munition works), a meeting of the committee was held in the Reading Room on Nov. 23rd to receive a statement of accounts from the hon. secretary, Dr. Chignell. In the absence of Mr. A. S. Heley, the Vicar took the chair, and the following very satisfactory report was read and passed:-

RECIPE FOR WAR CAKE.- 1 lb. flour, 3 oz. castor sugar, 6 oz. lard, dripping or butter, 4 oz. currants, 4 oz. raisins, 2 tablespoonfuls of vinegar, 2 level teaspoonfuls of carbonate of soda, 1 teaspoonful of ginger, teacup full of milk. Cream the butter and sugar, add dry ingredients and mix together. Dissolve the soda in the milk, and at the last moment stir in the vinegar. Bake in a moderate oven two hours.
