# ON SUNDAYS (10.30 a.m.).

AT MORNING SERVICE the Vicar will speak of six conditions of salvation, viz.: 1, Regeneration: "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit;" 2, Conversion, "Except ye be converted:" 3, Repentance, "Except ye repent;" 4, Righteousness, "Except your righteousness exceed, etc.;" 5, Spiritual Food, "Except ye eat the flesh of the Son of Man;" 6, Abiding in Christ, "Except ye abide in Me."

**AT EVENSONG** (5 p.m.) the Rev. A. E. Baynes will speak of: 1, Sin; 2, The need of Atonement; 3, The Person of the Mediator; 4, The Sacrifice of Calvary; 5, The Mission of the Holy Spirit; 6, Sanctification.

The Intercession service will be held on Wednesday evening at 5 during Lent, instead of Friday, and the addresses will be given on March 15<sup>th</sup> and the four following Wednesdays by the Rev. A. J. Moxon, Vicar of Stewkley.

There will be a celebration of Holy Communion on Thursdays at 8. On Fridays at 5 p.m. there will be a short service specially for children. The Intercession service at 7.30 will be for the present discontinued.

**EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN ON THE LAND**.- In spite of the rough weather there was a large attendance (over 100) at the Hall at the meeting on February 27<sup>th</sup>. It consisted principally of women. Very few farmers were present, which was unfortunate as the main object of the meeting was to bring employers and workers together for discussion and mutual explanation. Mr. Tarver was in the chair and Mrs. Roberts, of Ivinghoe, the County Council delegate, delivered a most practical and useful address on the question. (The address may be read verbatim in the local papers of last week). Mr. Frank Walker has been appointed Registrar for Wing and he is prepared to receive applications and to put all who are willing to work and all who want workers in place of men who have been withdrawn from the land, into communication with one another. The matter is very urgent and we hope there will be a ready response from both parties.

**MOTHERS' UNION**.- The quarterly meeting was held in the Parish Room on Wednesday, Feb. 23<sup>rd</sup>. The weather was most unpropitious, and prevented all mothers who lived at a distance from attending, but, nevertheless, forty-two members were present, a far larger number than could be expected, and they were rewarded by hearing an excellent and most practical address by Miss Cother, of Fenny Stratford.

THE CONFIRMATION.- Our candidates were so few in number this year that at the Vicar's request the Bishop of Buckingham confirmed them at Ivinghoe on Feb 20<sup>th</sup> instead of (as originally intended) at Wing on the 28<sup>th</sup>. There was some doubt at the time whether the state of the roads would admit of their driving to Ivinghoe, the snow was so deep, but after the unusually rough weather of the preceding four days, came a change of wind and a thaw, and all was well.

**THE SCHOOLS**.- The Diocesan Inspection was held on the mornings of Feb. 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup>- the boys on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, girls and infants 23<sup>rd</sup>.
